Whereas the Minister of the Environment has stated that his ministry will be reviewing the Greenfield South power proposal for new environmental evidence, And

Whereas the Ontario Municipal Board in their 2006 case, Greenfield vs. Mississauga, did not consider any environmental issues or concerns, And

Whereas Dr. Basillies report on the Clarkson airshed identified a stressed airshed and the need to consider accumulated emissions and their impacts on health in an environmental assessment, And

Whereas the Minister of the Environment has agreed with the recommendations in the report, on the need to consider cumulative emissions in the siting of power plants, And

Whereas the Etobicoke, Lakeview airshed has never had the benefit of such a detailed airshed, pollutant and particulate modeling program, And

Whereas the Premier was quoted this week as recommending that the Minister of Energy review the Greenfield South project to determine if the 280 MW is even required.

Therefore be it Resolved that the City of Mississauga request from the Minister of the Environment a Full Environmental Assessment to be conducted on the Greenfield South proposal taking into effect the cumulative impacts of all emissions within the Etobicoke Lakeview airshed.

And be it further Resolved that the City of Mississauga request the Minister of Energy to conduct a full review to determine the necessity of manufacturing 280 MW in a densely populated urban area as opposed to the Nanticoke transmission option where there is a three kilometre buffer zone.

- September 13, 2004 The Ontario Power Authority released a Request for Proposals for 'Clean Energy Supply'.
- January 26, 2005 A formal preliminary meeting was held with Greenfield South and
 City staff to determine information necessary to submit complete development
 applications. Greenfield South was proposing to develop lands located at 2315 Loreland
 Avenue for a 280 megawatt gas fired power generating facility in response to the
 Provincial request for proposal for 'Clean Energy Supply'.
- May 30, 2005 Without consultation with the City of Mississauga, Ontario Power
 Authority announced the selection of 2 proposals for gas fired power generating facilities
 in response to the September 13, 2004 request for proposal. Both projects were from

Respecting the site plan, the Board found the proposed volume of fuel to be stored on the site was excessive, and reduced it by 50%, relocated the noise wall to address concerns expressed at the hearing, and determined that any risks of ice impacts were marginal and could be properly responded to by Greenfield.
- April 1, 2009 Site Plan approval was issued in accordance with the 2007 OMB Order.
- May 28, 2009 A building permit to construct only underground services at the Loreland property was issued. This permit was revised on December 4, 2009.
- November 2010 The executed Servicing Agreement was modified to extend the completion date of Region water system upgrades until November 11, 2011.
- March 2011 Construction activity commenced on underground services and site grading, in accordance with the May 28, 2009 permit.
- May 30, 2011 Building permit to accommodate the construction of the above grade structures at the Loreland property was issued.

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The OPA Board of Directors takes very seriously its responsibilities to our contract counter-parties. Like the provincial government, we would like to achieve a resolution for the Greenfield South plant that provides both fair treatment to the counterparty and Ontario ratepayers. We also think it is important that electricity developers generally continue to have confidence to invest in Ontario and that gas-fired generation continues to be accepted as an important, cost-effective and safe part of the province's electricity supply mix.

After receiving your October 24th letter, OPA commenced discussions with Greenfield South because existing contract does not provide the OPA with any tools that would allow us to unilaterally meet the government's commitment. To date, OPA's objective has been to reach an agreement with Greenfield South to stop construction and negotiate a settlement to relocate the plant or terminate the contract, as a negotiated settlement would likely be the most cost-effective approach. Since then, it has become clear that Greenfield South is unlikely to agree to such an approach which makes unilateral termination of the contract a logical next step in order to limit the liabilities associated with relocating or cancelling the plant. The Board of Directors is therefore seeking clarity from you on whether the government agrees that the OPA should unilaterally terminate the Greenfield South contract.

In the event that the government is in agreement, we would then seek to commence discussions with Greenfield South to arrive at a settlement on appropriate compensation. Given our shared interest in ratepayer value, the board would then also like to commence a dialogue with you on the most appropriate way to allocate the compensation between ratepayers and taxpayers.

I look forward to discussing these matters with you.

At one point, we identified the need to address costs incurred to date (sunk costs – including equipment costs), construction and equipment related contracts and foregone revenue. Are there other headings that you can think of? Is there a willingness to provide compensation for all headings?

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Finally, is there any desire to deal with the land? For example, we could require remediation of the site (which would probably tie into compensation). We could expropriate the site for some sort of public interest or government purposes. Again, there are numerous options.

While full recognition must be given to rate-payer value and the fair treatment of contractual counterparties, as suggested in your letter, in light of the strong and persistent opposition to the plant, the government supports any appropriate commercial and other steps the OPA must take with the objectives of terminating the contract and ensuring that construction of the gas plant at its current location in Mississauga cease with immediacy.

This letter reflects unique circumstances in Mississauga. The Government remains committed to a strong, stable supply of electricity for Ontario and continues its support of those making investments in Ontario's electricity system.

As construction continues apace on the Eastern power plant that the Ontario Liberal government has promised to move out of Mississauga, the Conservative Opposition energy critic will hold a press conference on the site this morning.

Vic Fedeli, MPP for Nipissing and energy critic for the Progressive Conservatives, will use the power plant – which gets larger and larger with each growing day of construction — as a backdrop for cameras when he speaks to the media at 11 a.m. at the site on Loreland Ave.

As of last week, Liberal government officials and local MPPs remained at a loss to explain why work on the plant on Loreland, south of Dundas St. E. near the city's eastern boundary, continues more than six weeks after they announced on the campaign trail that they would cancel.

"I have no further progress to report," Energy Minister Chris Bentley said Nov. 9.

"We've committed to ... relocate the plant. I know the OPA (Ontario Power Authority) is working hard on this," said Bentley, who declined to answer specific questions about the project.

Premier Dalton McGuinty also struggled to account for the government's failure to act.

"Discussions are still underway," McGuinty said.

Eastern Power has refused to publicly comment on the issue for some time.

Citizenship and Immigration Minister Charles Sousa, whose Mississauga South riding borders the power plant, emphasized it would close.

Sousa made the surprise announcement on Sept. 24 — less than two weeks before the Oct. 6 provincial election — in a politically-successful bid to save Liberal seats in Mississauga and Etobicoke.

He said he could appreciate the concerns that residents have when trucks continue to rumble toward the bustling work site.

"We are going to have the plant relocated and we are in the process of doing that," said Sousa. "I don't want to divulge things that will compromise the situation."

Jim Wilson, the Progressive Conservative MPP for Simcoe-Grey, said McGuinty "misled the people of Mississauga and the people of Ontario."

Dear Minister

I am writing to you on behalf of the Ontario Power Authority's (OPA) Board of Directors with respect to the Greenfield South Power Plant, which the Ministry of Energy procured in 2004. The OPA was subsequently directed to enter into a contract with Greenfield and is now the sole counterparty. The beard clearly understands that the government's intention to relocate the plant is committed to not having the plant build at its current location, as committed during the provincial election and outlined in your letter to the OPA on October 24, 2011. The purpose of this letter is to seek direction on next steps to ensure that the government's commitment intention is met.

The OPA Board of Directors takes very seriously its responsibilities to our contract counter-parties. Like the provincial government, we would like to achieve a resolution for the Greenfield South plant that provides both fair treatment to the counterparty and Ontario ratepayers. We also think it is important that electricity developers generally continue to have confidence to invest in Ontario and that gas-fired generation continues to be accepted as an important, cost-effective and safe part of the province's electricity supply mix. At the same time, we recognize the public concern about the location of this plant and public requests that construction of the plant stop.

After receiving your October 24th letter, OPA commenced discussions with Greenfield South because existing contract does not provide the OPA with any tools that would allow us to unilaterally meet the government's commitment. To date, OPA's objective has been to reach an agreement with Greenfield South to stop construction and negotiate an arrangement settlement to relocate the plant or terminate the contract, as a negotiated settlement would likely be the most cost-effective approach. Since then, it has become clear that Greenfield South is unlikely to agree to such an approach which makes unilateral termination of the contract a logical next step_in order to limit the liabilities associated with relocating or cancelling the plant. The Board of Directors is therefore seeking clarity from you on whether the government agrees that the OPA should unilaterally terminate the Greenfield South contract.

In the event that the government is in agreement, www event then seek to commence continue discussions with Greenfield South to arrive at an settleagreement on appropriate compensation. Given our shared interest in ratepayer value, the board would then also like to commence a dialogue with you on the most appropriate way to allocate the compensation between ratepayers and taxpayers.

I look forward to discussing these matters with your reply.

Hi Catherine,

I have heard from my clients on at least part of the compensation question. Their sense is that it will be impossible not to pay the construction and equipment costs incurred to [date], which are approaching about \$300M. We have heard that 75% of the total cost has been incurred as of 2 weeks ago.

I like the "reasonable expenses" approach in the Adams Mine Lake Act. Looking at section 6(9), (b), (c), (f) and (g) would certainly be appropriate. We will have to determine how the site will be handled going forward in order to deal with (a) and (h) – acquiring the site – and we will want to be careful around (d) legal fees, I think (although there is a good argument for covering both development related legal fees and some legal fees associated with the termination of the contract). Marketing and promotion would not apply.

In addition, there are construction costs, equipment costs and costs associated with terminating construction and equipment contracts.

The Adams Mine approach references dates between which expenses were incurred. We know that the contract was originally dated April 12, 2005, which would be a reasonable starting point for Eastern's development-related costs (and which should, by implication, preclude expenses associated with the RFP by which Eastern was selected for the contract, which expenses would have also been excluded by the wording of the RFP itself).

An end date related to compensation is not known at this point. If Greenfield downs tools this week, I expect that will inform an end date for the period.

A "full accounting" (as in (4)) and access to records, staff, accountants, etc. (as in (5)) is desirable.

We are not yet clear whether the money would be paid in full or in part of the tax base (CRF) or the rate base, which will have certain other complications.

I still do not have instructions on good will or possible profits. Considering how a draft bill might be used, as a starting position, compensation for neither will likely be appropriate.

I will provide more as I have it.





"CEM System" means the continuous emission monitoring and recording devices to continuously monitor and record the concentrations of nitrogen oxides, carbon monoxide and oxygen at the Combustion Turbine Facility exhaust stack, and shall be designed, installed and operated following the recommendations of the document titled "Protocols and Performance Specifications for Continuous Monitoring of Gaseous Emissions from Thermal Power Generation Report EPS 1/PG/7" published by Environment Canada in September 1993, as modified.

- 16. "Manager" means the Manager, Technology Standards Section, Standards Development Branch of the Ministry, or any other person who represents and carries out the duties of the Manager, as those duties relate to the conditions of this Certificate.
- 17. "Manual" means a document or a set of documents that provide written instructions to staff of the Company.
- 18. "Ministry" means Ontario Ministry of the Environment.
- 19. "NOx" means oxides of nitrogen, including nitric oxide (NO) and nitrogen dioxide (NO₂).
- 20. "Noise Control Measures" means measures to reduce the noise emissions from the Facility and/or Equipment including, but not limited to, silencers, acoustical louvres, hoods and acoustical treatment, described in Schedule "D" of this Certificate and in supporting information including the Noise Report.

- 21. "Noise Report" means the report entitled "Environmental Acoustic Assessment Report, Proposed Combined Cycle Power Plant", prepared by HGC Engineering, dated October 6, 2008.
- 22. "Non-peaking Mode" means operation of the gas turbine exceeding the hour of operation limits specified in the Peaking Mode.
- 23. "O. Reg. 419/05" means Ontario Regulation 419/05, Air Pollution Local Air Quality.
- 24. "Point of Impingement" means any point in the natural environment and as defined by s. 2 of O. Reg. 419/05.
- 25. "Primary Fuel" means the fuel used in the Facility to generate 10% or more of the electricity in a contract year.
- 26. "Peaking Mode" means operation of the gas turbine not more than 7,500 hours in any five (5) year period and, in those years, a total of not more than 3,000 hours during the months of May, June, July, August and September.
- 27. "Power Output" means the electricity and shaft power production of the Combustion Turbine Facility, expressed in megawatts.
- 28. "Pre-Test Information" means the information outlined in Section 1 of the Source Testing Code.
- 29. "Publication NPC-103" means the Ministry Publication NPC-103 of the Model Municipal Noise Control By-Law, Final Report, August 1978, published by the Ministry as amended.
- 30. "Publication NPC-205" means Ministry Publication NPC-205, "Sound Level Limits for Stationary Sources in Class 1 & 2 Areas (Urban)", October, 1995.
- 31. "Publication NPC-233" means Ministry Publication NPC-233, "Information to be Submitted for Approval of Stationary Sources of Sound", October 1995.
- 32. "Source Testing" means sampling and testing to measure emissions resulting from operating the Combustion Turbine Facility under conditions which yield the worst case emissions within the approved operating range of the Combustion Turbine Facility.
- 33. "Source Testing Code" means the Source Testing Code, Version 2, Report No. ARB-66-80, dated November 1980, prepared by the Ministry, as amended.
- 34. "Thermal Efficiency" means the fraction of the total energy input which is transformed into net useful energy output, usually expressed as a percentage on a lower heating value basis, calculated according to the formula described in Schedule "B" of this Certificate.

You are hereby notified that this approval is issued to you subject to the terms and conditions outlined below:

TERMS AND CONDITIONS

PERFORMANCE REQUIREMENTS

1. The Company shall ensure that the Facility is designed and operated to comply, when it is operated, with the following performance requirements:

Emission Limits

(1) The concentrations of nitrogen oxides, sulphur dioxide and carbon monoxide in the undiluted gases emitted from the Combustion Turbine Facility exhaust stack are not greater than the limits specified in Schedule "A" of this Certificate.

Thermal Efficiency

(2) The Thermal Efficiency of the Combustion Turbine Facility is not less than the thermal efficiency specified in Schedule "A" of this Certificate.

Noise Limits

(3) The Company shall ensure that the noise emissions from the Facility comply with the limits determined in accordance with Publication NPC-205.

MONITORING

2. The Company shall, when the Combustion Turbine Facility is operating in the Peaking Mode and has not operated previously in the Non-peaking Mode, monitor the emissions and operation of the Combustion Turbine Facility as follows:

Source Testing

- (1) The Company shall perform, initially after the commencement of operation of the Combustion Turbine Facility and every two (2) years thereafter, Source Testing to determine the emission rates of NOx, carbon monoxide and oxygen from the Combustion Turbine Facility exhaust stack, when the Combustion Turbine Facility is fired with Primary Fuel. Three (3) source tests shall be conducted at maximum rating or at the maximum load achievable at the time of testing.
- (2) The Company shall submit, within three (3) months after the commencement of operation of the Combustion Turbine Facility, to the Manager a test protocol, including the Pre-Test Information for the Source Testing required by the Source Testing Code. The Company shall finalize the test protocol in consultation with the Manager.
- (3) The Company shall complete the Source Testing within three (3) months after the Manager has accepted the test protocol, or within a period directed or agreed by the District Manager.

- (4) The Company shall notify the District Manager and the Manager in writing of the location, date and time of any impending Source Testing required by this Certificate, at least fifteen (15) days prior to the Source Testing.
- (5) The Company shall, whenever a Source Testing has completed, submit a report on the Source Testing to the District Manager and the Manager not later than two (2) months after completing the Source Testing. The report shall be in the format described in the Source Testing Code, and shall also include the following:
 - (a) an Executive Summary,
 - (b) all records of the operating conditions of the Combustion Turbine Facility at times of the Source Testing,
 - (c) all results and average of the source tests obtained during the Source Testing, and
 - (d) a comparison of the results and the average of the results obtained during the Source Testing with the applicable emission limits in Schedule "A".
- (6) The Director may not accept the results of the Source Testing if:
 - (a) the Source Testing Code or the requirements of the Manager were not followed, or
 - (b) the Company did not notify the District Manager and the Manager of the Source Testing, or
 - (c) the Company failed to provide a complete report on the Source Testing.
- (7) If the Director does not accept the results of the Source Testing, the Director may require to repeat Source Testing.
- 3. In the event that the operation of the Combustion Turbine Facility has switched or is expected to switch from the Peaking Mode to Non-peaking Mode, the Company shall, within three (3) months after the switch or expectation of the switch, install and maintain operational a CEM System to continuously monitor and record the concentrations of NOx, carbon monoxide and oxygen in the undiluted gases leaving the Combustion Turbine Facility exhaust stack, and shall continue to use the CEM System to monitor emissions from the Combustion Turbine Facility when the Combustion Turbine Facility stays in operation. The locations and specifications of the CEM system are outlined in Schedule "C".
- 4. The Company shall perform a test, initially after the commencement of operation of the Combustion Turbine Facility and every two (2) years thereafter, to determine the Thermal Efficiency of the Combustion Turbine Facility. The Company shall conduct the Thermal Efficiency test at the same time when the Source Testing is conducted when Source Testing is used for emissions monitoring. The Company shall:

- submit, within three (3) months after the commencement of operation of the Combustion Turbine Facility, to the Manager a test protocol, including the Pre-Test Information for the Thermal Efficiency test.
- (b) The Company shall finalize the test protocol in consultation with the Manager.
- (c) The Company shall not commence the Thermal Efficiency test until the Manager has accepted the test protocol.
- (d) The Company shall complete the first Thermal Efficiency test, within three (3) months after the Manager has accepted the test protocol, or within a period directed or agreed by the District Manager.
- (e) The Company shall notify the District Manager and the Manager, in writing, of the location, date and time of any impending Thermal Efficiency test required by this Certificate, at least fifteen (15) days prior to the Thermal Efficiency test.
- (f) The Company shall determine the parameters described in Schedule "B" attached to this Certificate, during the Thermal Efficiency test for the Combustion Turbine Facility.
- (g) The Company shall calculate the Thermal Efficiency of the Combustion Turbine Facility according to the formula described in Schedule "B" attached to this Certificate.
- (h) The Company shall prepare a summary of the results of the Thermal Efficiency test no later than two (2) months after completing the test. The summary shall indicate the Thermal Efficiency of the Combustion Turbine Facility and include all parameters described in Schedule "B" attached to this Certificate.
- (i) If the measured Thermal Efficiency is less than the anticipated Thermal Efficiency specified in Schedule "A" of this Certificate (with a tolerance of 0.05 multiplied by the anticipated Thermal Efficiency), the Company shall notify the Ministry so that the concentration limits specified in Schedule "A" of this Certificate could be revised accordingly.

OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE:

- 5. The Company shall ensure that the Facility is properly operated and maintained at all times. The Company shall:
 - (1) prepare, prior to commencement of operation of the Facility and update, as necessary, a Manual outlining the operating procedures and a maintenance program for the Facility, including:
 - (a) routine operating and maintenance procedures according to good engineering practices and as recommended by Equipment suppliers;
 - (b) emergency procedures;

- (c) frequency of inspection and maintenance of equipment in the Facility;
- (d) procedures for recording and responding to environmental complaints;
- (e) a list of job positions responsible for operation of the Equipment; and
- (f) all appropriate measures to minimize fugitive air emissions from all potential sources;
- (2) implement the procedures, measures and recommendations of the Manual.
- 6. The Company shall fully implement the Noise Control Measures prior to commencement of operations of the Equipment.

ACOUSTIC AUDIT

- 7.1 The Company shall:
 - (1) carry out acoustic audit measurements on the actual noise emissions due to the operation of the Facility, in accordance with the procedures in Publication NPC-103;
 - submit a report on the results of the acoustic audit, prepared by an Independent Acoustical Consultant, in accordance with the requirements of Publication NPC-233, to the District Manager and the Director not later than three (3) months after the Commencement of Commercial Operation of the Equipment.
- 7.2 The Director may:
 - (1) not accept the results of the acoustic audit if the requirements of Publication NPC-233 were not followed;
 - (2) require the Company to repeat the acoustic audit if the results of the acoustic audit are found unacceptable to the Director.

RECORD RETENTION:

- 8. The Company shall retain, for a minimum of two (2) years from the date of their creation, or in accordance with the requirements of other applicable regulations, all records and information related to or resulting from the maintenance of the Equipment and monitoring activities required by this Certificate. The Company shall retain:
 - (1) all records on the maintenance and repair of the Equipment;
 - (2) all records produced by the Source Testing and, if equipped, the CEM System;

- (3) all records of the Thermal Efficiency tests, including calculations of the Thermal Efficiency of the Combustion Turbine Facility;
- (4) all records and results of the acoustic audit measurements and the acoustic audit report;
- (5) all records on the environmental complaints, or incidents, if any; including:
 - (a) a description, time and date of each incident to which the complaint relates,
 - (b) wind direction at the time of the incident to which the complaint relates, and
 - (c) a description of the measures taken to address the cause of the incident to which the complaint relates and to prevent a similar occurrence in the future.

These records shall be made available to staff of the Ministry on request.

NOTIFICATION OF COMPLAINTS

- 9. The Company shall notify the District Manager, in writing, of each environmental complaint within two (2) business days of the complaint. The notification shall include:
 - (1) this Certificate number;
 - (2) a description of the nature of the complaint;
 - (3) the time and date of the incident to which the complaint relates; and
 - (4) a description of the measures taken to address the cause of the incident to which the complaint relates and to prevent a similar occurrence in the future.

The reasons for the imposition of these terms and conditions are as follows:

- 1. Conditions 1 and 6 are included to outline the minimum performance requirements considered necessary to prevent an adverse effect resulting from the operation of the Facility.
- 2. Conditions 2, 3 and 4 are included to require the Company to gather accurate information so that the environmental impact and subsequent compliance with the Act, the regulations and this Certificate can be verified.
- 3. Condition 5 is included to emphasize that the Facility must be maintained and operated according to a procedure that will result in compliance with the Act, the regulations and this Certificate.
- 4. Condition 7 is included to require the Company to gather accurate information so that the environmental noise impact and subsequent compliance with the Act, the regulations, Ministry Noise Guidelines and this Certificate can be verified.

5.	Condition 8 is included to require the Company to keep records to assist the Ministry in determining
	whether or not the Equipment is being inspected and maintained as required by the Act, the regulations
	and this Certificate.

6.	Condition 9 is included to require the Company to notify staff of the Ministry so as to assist the Ministry
	with the review of the site's compliance.

AS TRANSCRIBED BY HP

1. Parties

Ontario Power Authority ("OPA") and Greenfield South Power Corporation ("Greenfield") Eastern Power Limited ("Eastern Power")

2. Purpose

To settle the Keele Valley matter with OEFC and to provide a commercial basis for the stoppage of construction at the Site of the Greenfield South Generating Station in Mississauga, Ontario, and for Greenfield and the OPA to enter into negotiations to relocate the project or terminate the ARCES Contract.

3. Term Sheet Not Binding

Nothing in this term sheet is binding on the parties.

4. Definitions

Capitalized terms not defined in the agreement will have the same meaning as capitalized terms in the ARCES Contract. ¹

"Site" means 2315 Loreland Avenue, Mississauga, ON L4X 2A6

5. Contract Subsists

Notwithstanding any agreement to stop construction at the Site, the ARCES Contract subsists.

6. No Waiver

Neither party waives any rights or is relieved of any obligations under the ARCES Contract, except for the obligations on the parties to perform their respective obligations expeditiously pursuant to s.16.12.

7. Term

The term of the agreement shall expire when the ARCES Contract is terminated.

The contents of the term sheet and any agreement flowing from it are to be kept confidential by the parties.

12. Site Security

The parties further agree that the arbitration will be conducted on a confidential basis.

I am writing to you on behalf of the Ontario Power Authority's (OPA) Board of Directors with respect to the Greenfield South Power Plant, which the Ministry of Energy procured in 2004. The OPA was subsequently directed to enter into a contract with Greenfield and is now the sole counterparty. The Board clearly understands that the government's intention to relocate the plant as outlined in your letter to the OPA on October 24, 2011.

The OPA Board of Directors takes very seriously its responsibilities to our contract counter-parties. Like the provincial government, we would like to achieve a resolution for the Greenfield South plant that provides both fair treatment to the counterparty and Ontario ratepayers. We also think it is important that electricity developers generally continue to have confidence to invest in Ontario and that gas-fired generation continues to be accepted as an important, cost-effective and safe part of the province's electricity supply mix. At the same time, we recognize the public concern about the location of this plant and public requests that construction of the plant stop.

After receiving your October 24th letter, OPA commenced discussions with Greenfield South. EXPLANATORY NOTE

to follow

Bill 2011

An Act to Terminate the Greenfield South Power Project in the City of Mississauga

Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario, enacts as follows:

Definition

1. In this Act,

"Corporation" means Greenfield South Power Corporation; ("French")

"project" means the Greenfield South Power Project undertaken by the Corporation on the site (do we include related servicing or the water mains that are not on the actual site but which may have been put in?); ("")

"site" means the real property that is part of Lot 3, Concession 1 in the City of Mississauga known municipally as 2315 Loreland Avenue; ("French") - is this an accurate description of the land? (taken from the cert. of approval)

Are there any other structures/improvements to the land unrelated to the project or any part of the construction for the project that will be allowed to remain on it? Was the land serviced before the project or as part of the project? The new water mains on the street? Are they in? Do they stay or are they to be taken out? Do we include them as part of the "project"? Is there anything else that is not on the actual site but should be included in the description of the project?

For the moment, I have differentiated between the real property and the project on it in case you need to talk about each separately re remediation of the site, stopping the project, etc.

Prohibition on continuing construction of the project

2. (1) If, on or before the day this section comes into force, the Corporation has not ceased construction and other activities on the site related to the construction of the project, the Corporation shall ensure that the construction and other activities on the site related to the construction of the project are stopped and the following actions are taken within the time

specified by the Minister and in a manner that complies with all applicable laws (any municipal by-laws affecting removal and remediation?):

- 1. removal of all improvements to the real property forming part of or to be used in connection with the project and the transmission of electricity? (What happened to the new water mains MOE approved? Are they in? Do they stay? Was the land serviced before the project? If not, do they leave the services? Were transmission facilities in yet? Who owns them?) may need to indicate just what you want removed. Need language for this.
- 2. remediation of the site?
- 3. relocation of the project to somewhere else or will that be handled outside the Act?

How do you want the above described. Need lingo relating to "undeveloping" and remediating the land. If you want to legislate a detailed list of things to be done, it can be made a schedule to the Act. Do we cross-reference to any existing legislation governing remediation?

Same

(2) Despite any agreement or other arrangement to which a person is a party, the person shall cease engaging in activities relating to the construction and development of the project. (placeholder - Do we need to expressly tell the contractors and trades to put down the tools or leave it up to the Corporation? If Corporation tells them to stop, results in breach of contract with the contractors?)

Exception

(3) Nothing in this section prohibits the Corporation or any other person from taking such reasonable action as may be necessary to prevent theft of or damage to property and to prevent safety risks in connection with the project and the site. (Don't want to stop them from taking any necessary action to keep the site safe and prevent loss or injury.)

Revocation of approvals relating to the project

- **3.** (1) The following are revoked:
 - 1. Certificate of Approval Number 2023-7HUMVW issued December 10, 2008 under section 9 of the Environmental Protection Act to the Corporation in respect of the project.
 - Amended Certificate of Approval Number 2098-76NYD issued September 4, 2008 under Part V of the Safe Drinking Water Act, 2002 to the Corporation.

Building permit issued by the City? Was a development plan approved for the site? A rezoning?

Termination of agreement

4. The agreement dated as of April 12, 2005 and amended and restated as of March 16, 2009 between the Corporation and Ontario Power Authority relating to the project is terminated. (retroactively? Deemed never to have been entered into or just terminated on Royal assent or an earlier date?) Did OPA or any other government entity provide financing up-front that needs to be repaid to the Crown? If so, is it to be deducted from the compensation in section 6?

Should the bill terminate any of the agreements/contracts the Corporation entered into relating to the project to protect the Corporation from breach of contract actions and for liability for future payments under the contracts for work not yet done? The contractors are losing future profit from finishing the rest of the project. The Corporation may also be in breach of its terms of borrowing for the project if it ceases construction and may be subject to penalties if it repays the lenders. Better minds than mine will know more about these risks and how they should be handled.

Extinguishment of causes of action

5. (1) Any cause of action that exists on the day this section comes into force against the Crown in right of Ontario, a member or former member of the Executive Council, or an employee or agent or former employee or agent of the Crown in right of Ontario, the Ontario Power Authority or any employee or agent or former employee or agent of Ontario Power Authority in respect of the project or the site is hereby extinguished.

Same

(2) No cause of action arises after this Act comes into force against a person referred to in subsection (1) in respect of the project or the site if the cause of action would arise, in whole or in part, from anything that occurred after April 5, 2005 (date of first agreement or should this be earlier?) and before this section comes into force.

Enactment of this Act

(3) Subject to section 6, no cause of action arises against a person referred to in subsection (1), and no compensation is payable by a person referred to in subsection (1), as a direct or indirect result of the enactment of any provision of this Act.

Application

(4) Without limiting the generality of subsections (1), (2) and (3), those subsections apply to a cause of action in respect of any agreement, or in respect of any representation or other conduct, that is related to the project or the site.

Same

(5) Without limiting the generality of subsections (1), (2) and (3), those subsections apply to a cause of action arising in contract, tort, restitution, trust, fiduciary obligations or otherwise.

Legal proceedings

(6) No action or other proceeding shall be commenced or continued by any person against a person referred to in subsection (1) in respect of a cause of action that is extinguished by subsection (1) or a cause of action that, pursuant to subsection (2) or (3), does not arise.

Same

(7) Without limiting the generality of subsection (6), that subsection applies to an action or other proceeding claiming any remedy or relief, including specific performance, injunction, declaratory relief, any form of compensation or damages, or any other remedy or relief.

Same

(8) Subsection (6) applies to actions and other proceedings commenced before or after this section comes into force.

No expropriation

(9) Nothing in this Act and nothing done or not done in accordance with this Act constitutes an expropriation or injurious affection for the purposes of the *Expropriations Act* or otherwise at law.

Compensation

6. (1) The Crown in right of Ontario shall pay compensation to the Corporation in accordance with this section. Is the only compensation paid to the owner or is compensation to be paid by the Crown directly to the contractors and trades or the Corporation's lenders?

Amount

- (2) Subject to subsection (3), the amount of the compensation payable to the Corporation under subsection (1) is the sum of the following amounts:
 - 1. The amount of the reasonable expenses incurred and paid by the Corporation after April 12, 2005 [date of original OPA agreement?] and before [second date] for the purpose of developing the project.
 - 2. The lesser of,
 - i. the reasonable expenses that,
 - A. were incurred by the Corporation after April 12, 2005 and before [second date], but not paid before [second date], and

- B. were incurred for the purpose of developing the project,
- ii. \$? (estimate of expenses incurred but not yet paid).
- 3. The amount of reasonable expenses incurred or to be incurred by the Corporation to [remove the project and remediate the land need language for here]
- 4. The amount of the reasonable expenses for legal fees and disbursements incurred by Greenfield South Power Corporation on or after [second date], in respect of legal services provided in connection with? [need language to describe legal fees for what] on or after that day and before this section comes into force.

(3) If the Crown in right of Ontario acquires the site, the amount of the compensation payable under subsection (1) shall be the amount determined under subsection (2), less the fair market value, on the day this section comes into force, of the site (as improved by the project? after remediation? or the value as vacant land before the project started?)

Accounting

(4) Subsection (1) does not apply unless, not later than 120 days after this section comes into force, the Corporation submits to the Crown in right of Ontario a full accounting of the expenses described in subsection (2), including any receipts for payment.

Audit

(5) The Corporation shall provide the Crown in right of Ontario with reasonable access to its records, management staff, auditors and accountants for the purpose of reviewing and auditing any accounting submitted under subsection (4).

Application to Superior Court of Justice

(6) The Corporation or the Crown in right of Ontario may apply to the Superior Court of Justice to determine any issue of fact or law related to this section that is in dispute.

Payment out of C.R.F.

(7) The Minister of Finance shall pay out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund any amount payable by the Crown in right of Ontario under this section. (placeholder – need authority to fund the payment from somewhere)

Loss of goodwill or possible profits

(8) For greater certainty, no compensation is payable under subsection (1) for any loss of goodwill or possible profits. (another placeholder in case you need it)

Reasonable expenses

- (9) For greater certainty and subject to subsection (10), a reference in this section to reasonable expenses incurred for the purpose of developing the project includes reasonable expenses incurred for that purpose for,
 - (a) seeking to acquire and acquiring the site for the development of the project;
 - (b) surveys, studies and testing;
 - (c) engineering and design services;
 - (d) construction, including construction of related improvements to real property; (I am referring to related improvements because of the water mains under the street, site servicing or whatever else there may be that is not the power project per se is this needed?)
 - (e) terminating contracts for the construction of the project and related improvements to real property?
 - (f) legal fees and disbursements relating to...;
 - (g) property taxes; and
 - (h) seeking government approvals.

Same

- (10) For greater certainty, a reference in this section to reasonable expenses,
 - (a) does not include any expense that exceeds the fair market value of the goods or services for which the expense was incurred; and
 - (b) does not include any expense for which the Corporation has been reimbursed by another person.

What other provisions are needed in the bill?

In response to your letter of [date] and in recognition that community opposition to the Greenfield South Generation Facility is ongoing and well documented, I am writing to confirm that the government supports OPA's decision to terminate the contract with the developer of the facility, Greenfield South Power Corporation. The government remains hopeful that the plant can be relocated and that the OPA will be able to achieve a satisfactory resolution of the Mississauga site through discussion with Greenfield SPC.

While full recognition must be given to rate-payer value and the fair treatment of contractual counterparties, as suggested in your letter, in light of the strong and persistent opposition to the plant, the government supports termination of the contract and any other appropriate commercial and other steps the OPA must take in seeking to stop construction of the gas plant at its current location, with the objectives of terminating the contract and ensuring that construction of the gas plant at its current location in Mississauga ceases imminently.

I am writing to you on behalf of the Ontario Power Authority's (OPA) Board of Directors with respect to the Greenfield South Power Plant, which the Ministry of Energy procured in 2004. The OPA was subsequently directed to enter into a contract with Greenfield and is now the sole counterparty. The Board clearly understands that the government's intention to relocate the plant as outlined in your letter to the OPA on October 24, 2011.

The OPA Board of Directors takes very seriously its responsibilities to our contract counter-parties. Like the provincial government, we would like to achieve a resolution for the Greenfield South plant that provides both fair treatment to the counterparty and Ontario ratepayers. We also think it is important that electricity developers generally continue to have confidence to invest in Ontario and that gas-fired generation continues to be accepted as an important, cost-effective and safe part of the province's electricity supply mix. At the same time, we recognize the public concern about the location of this plant and public requests that construction of the plant stop.

After receiving your October 24th letter, the OPA commenced discussions with Greenfield South. To date, the OPA's preferred approach objective has been to reach an agreement with Greenfield South to stop construction and negotiate an arrangement to relocate the plant or terminate the contract. Since then, it has become more clearer that Greenfield South may not agree to such an approach which makes termination of the contract a logical next step. The Board of Directors is therefore seeking the Government's support in taking this step.

I wish to assure you that, even after taking this step, the OPA shall sFollowing termination of the contract, we would seek to continue discussions with Greenfield South to arrive at an agreement on appropriate compensation. Given our shared interest in ratepayer value, the board would then also like to commence a dialogue with you on the most appropriate way to allocate the compensation between the OPA and the Crown.
